

Current Trends: Theory & Practice in ELT



Course length and times

This is a 30-hour course, three hours a day for two weeks. It runs from 09.00 – 12.00 in January and 13.15 – 16.15 in July and August.

You will have access to the library and study centre during your course. You can watch DVDs of lessons, take out journals and books, or study English in our computer room.

Who is the course for?

This course is primarily intended for experienced and/or practising teachers of English in an ELT context who are seeking to explore the underlying principles of current ELT methodologies and approaches. Practical demonstrations and teaching materials are used to illustrate the methods and to give a deeper understanding of how and why a method would work in the language classroom. Participants should have an English level of C1 (Advanced) on the Common European Framework to follow this course.

Course objectives

By the end of the course participants will:

- › have developed an awareness and understanding of current ELT principles and practice.
- › have developed an ability to critically examine and evaluate current ELT principles and practice
- › have developed an ability to evaluate current trends in relation to their own teaching and to their learners needs
- › have had opportunities to raise and explore teaching issues relevant to their own context.
- › have acquired a range of practical teaching ideas and materials.

Examples of syllabus content

- › The Lexical Approach
- › Task-based learning
- › Learner autonomy
- › Content and Language Integrated Learning (CLIL)
- › Assessment and correction
- › Motivation theories and motivating learners in the classroom
- › Teaching large groups
- › Teaching mixed ability groups
- › Exploiting authentic and non-authentic listening and reading texts
- › Emerging methodologies e.g. the Flipped Classroom

Other areas can be included according to the needs of a particular group of course participants.
